<u>AHCCCS Freedom to Work-The Basics:</u> Many people with disabilities fear that if they return to work and start earning more money, they'll lose their AHCCCS coverage. With AHCCCS Freedom to Work, one can earn more income and keep their AHCCCS coverage. It pays for visits to the doctor, hospital stays, medical equipment, home care services, and mental health services.

<u>The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP)</u>: is a federally funded program that helps supplement the diets of low-income Americans, including elderly people, by providing them with emergency food and nutrition assistance at no cost. <u>Long-Term Disability Insurance (LTD)</u>: pays a portion of one's income after they run out of STD. Depending on their plan, LTD may pay them for a specific number of years until they turn 65 years old for example.

<u>Short-Term Disability Insurance (STD)</u>: is private insurance that replaces some of one's income if they can't work because of an injury or illness. The injury or illness does not have to be work-related. STD pays a portion of their income for a short period of time. Depending on one's plan, STD generally will last between nine and 52 weeks (one year). The average STD policy in Arizona lasts for six months.

<u>Short-Term Crisis Services (STCS) Program:</u> provides temporary assistance to low income families experiencing an emergency that cannot be met immediately by their own income, the resources to help stabilize an immediate financial crisis. In order to receive these services a dependent child must live in the home.
